Law Enforcement Torch Run® for Special Olympics Fact Sheet

WHAT IS THE LAW ENFORCEMENT TORCH RUN?

Over the past 29 years, the Law Enforcement Torch Run has evolved from a symbolic awareness run to one of the most unique annual fund raising efforts by the law enforcement community, raising over \$300 million since its inception and over \$34 million in 2009. From Torch Run t-shirt sales and "Adopt-A-Cop" runner sponsorships to Polar Plunge® and Cops on Doughnut Shops® fundraisers, the Torch Run raises funds so that Special Olympics athletes can continue to benefit from training and competing in Special Olympics sports.

More than 85,000 law enforcement officers from 43 nations contribute to the Torch Run efforts annually as Guardians of the Flame® ensuring the delivery of the Special Olympics Flame of Hope $^{\text{TM}}$ to the Opening Ceremonies of local Special Olympics competitions, state/provincial Games, and National Summer or Winter Games.

Every two years, law enforcement officers from around the world gather to carry the Flame of Hope in a Law Enforcement Torch Run Final Leg in honor of the Special Olympics World Summer or World Winter Games. The last World Games Final Leg took place in 2009 when an international team of law enforcement officers and Special Olympics athletes conducted runs and ceremonies in many communities throughout Idaho to heighten awareness of Special Olympics and the World Games. The most recent USA National Games took place in Iowa in 2006, and the Final Leg Team started their journey at historic Soldier Field in Chicago, the site of the first International Special Olympics Games in 1968, and ran throughout the state of Iowa before safely delivering the Flame of Hope to the 2006 USA National Games Opening Ceremonies in Ames, Iowa.

The Law Enforcement Torch Run began in 1981 when Wichita, Kansas (USA), Police Chief Richard LaMunyon saw an urgent need to raise funds for and increase awareness of Special Olympics. The Torch Run was quickly adopted by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), now recognized as the <u>founding law enforcement organization</u> of the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics.

The Law Enforcement Torch Run® for Special Olympics Final Leg for the 2010 USA National Games

Event Overview

The Final Leg tradition is for law enforcement officers and Special Olympics athletes, representing their state and Torch Run/Special Olympics Program, to act as Guardians of the Flame® and carry the Special Olympics Torch and Flame of Hope™ to the Opening Ceremonies of the Special Olympics USA National Games. This Torch Run event is called the Final Leg because it represents the culmination of Law Enforcement Torch Run® (LETR) events that have occurred previously throughout the United States in 2010. The LETR Final Leg is not only a salute to the athletes from around the United States who will participate in the Final Leg and compete in the Special Olympics USA National Games, but also an honor for the participating law enforcement officers who comprise the Torch Run Final Leg Team.

The Olympic flame symbolizes the light of spirit, knowledge and life. With identical power and majesty, the Special Olympics Flame of Hope™, in the entrusted care of the law enforcement community, symbolizes the courage and celebration of diversity that the Special Olympics movement represents.

- Create awareness and excitement for Special Olympics and USA National Games
- Encourage support and attendance of the USA National Games
- Proudly represent Law Enforcement and Torch Run Programs in the United States as a symbol of our deep commitment to the athletes of Special Olympics as we serve as ambassadors for Law Enforcement, Special Olympics, and the National Games
- Make athlete involvement a vital part of the Final Leg—in addition to having Special Olympics athletes as a part of the Final Leg Team, our goal is to highlight local athletes at ceremonies
- Fulfill our role as Guardians of the Flame® by maintaining the flame until the lighting of the cauldron at the USA National Games Opening Ceremonies
- Be a part of the development of a media relations strategy to publicize and promote the Final Leg and USA National Games to the fullest extent
- Place emphasis on creating and planning the best ceremony possible in every community to help fulfill the mission of the Final Leg
- Involve, inspire, and motivate runners to increase their level of commitment to Special Olympics when they
 return to their local programs

When and Where

The 2010 Law Enforcement Torch Run Final Leg will precede the Special Olympics USA National Games held in Lincoln, Nebraska. The flame lighting ceremony to begin the Final Leg is scheduled for Sunday, July 11th at Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa, the site of the last USA National Games in 2006. The Flame of Hope™ will enter Nebraska on the evening of July 11th and then travel throughout the state for one week. The Final Leg Team will conduct runs and ceremonies at over 70 cities and towns throughout Nebraska before arriving at the USA National Games Opening Ceremonies in Lincoln on July 18, 2010.

Who

The Final Leg Team (110 members strong) will be comprised of law enforcement runners, Special Olympics athletes, and Support Team members. Law enforcement officers will be chosen from Torch Run Programs in the United States. Nine Special Olympics athletes will also be selected to be a part of the Final Leg Team in 2010.

Michael served on the Board of Directors for SONC for six years and also served on the Board for the 1999 Special Olympics World Summer Games in North Carolina. 
MINNESOTA


LOUISIANA


UTAH




Jason Niemi Sergeant Wheatland Police Department


NORTH CAROLINA




Rich Fernandez
