My name is Ben Haack, and I am an Athlete Leader from Australia. Last year's Unified Cup that was held in the Motor City of Detroit, and was the second edition of this tournament. What kick started this whole concept was an event that was held during the 2010 FIFA World Cup that was called the Unity Cup. This was a celebrity Unified game that was played before the Q/Final of the Argentine Germany game. As a participant of that event, it was simply humbling to watch this truly World Class event that happened in Detroit this summer. The standard of everything from the Opening Ceremony to the way the teams prepared and competed was outstanding. It looked like a professional tournament, and some of the play was amazing.

Unified is a concept where people with and without disabilities play together on the same field. The purpose of this is to break down barriers both on and off the field and to create people who will fight for inclusion. So, this event is a transformative event in many ways that go beyond a typical sporting event.

The biggest highlight for me was during the SO Egypt v. SO Costa Rica finals game. A Costa Rican by the name of Jerdine Gouldbourne, had just scored potentially the match winning goal, but instead of running over to her teammates to celebrate or to celebrate on her own in the usual way, she went over and consoled the Egyptian Goalkeeper. Right during the tensest of moments in football, when the glory was hers, she decided to console the opposition. I have never seen that before during a penalty shootout. Not in a Champions League, World Cup, never.

This is the message these events bring. Ultimately for me what I hope that happens that happens off the back of this event moving forward is twofold. Firstly, I want to see a time when people with disabilities can be involved at all levels of football. That every local football club and program runs Special Olympics programs including Unified. So that anybody including our lowest ability Athletes can be apart of the beautiful game. The programmatic capacity is there, so why not?

But also, I would like to see this Unified level of our movement become professional. Just looking at what I saw, why not? This is what I would like to see.

# MEN'S GALLAGHER COACHES' COACH AWARD 

Head Coach of Special Olympics Singapore, Yuchi Huang was awarded the 2022 Gallagher Coaches' Coach Award, for his excellent coaching skills.

Voted by his peers, Huang was unanimously voted for this prestigious award
presented by Gallagher
"I was never a skillful, fit, or intelligent football player during my growing up years. That changed when I met my first coach, when I first started to play organized football in secondary school. Mr. Joseph, who taught me the values that hard work can beat talent, that getting the basics right was important. This meant that as a player, it is to put in the commitment to win the ball on the field, and make a simple pass to a teammate, that I have done my job as a defender. Having a coach who showed me the right way to train and play has definitely planted a seed in how I have approach coaching since then.

When the opportunity came along in 2012 for me to sign-up and coach one of the Singapore Boys team at the Southeast Asia Unified 5 -a-side Football Competition, I jumped at the chance to do so. It marks the start of my football coaching adventure with Special Olympics Singapore and I have stayed on ever since.

Our objective is to focus on promoting sports participation and meaningful involvement, and not a winning-at-all-cost mentality. When we see the growth and development of our athletes within and outside the football field, it can bring about much joy and pride, beyond just the score line of a football match.

For the Unified Cup competition, we formed a training squad with the recruitment of new athletes and unified partners into our existing outreach football members. Selection trials began in January, and the six month process allowed the coaches to learn more about our players, and find the right complementary unified partners who can work well with our athletes.
Find pieces that complete our jigsaw puzzle, took us some time to figure it out, and the team showed their quality during the competition. Many players stepped up to the challenge, playing out of their usual position when a fellow teammate is ill or injured, overcome their own personal hurdles, and achieve their individual targets. An athlete spoke to me after a particular match and thanked me for believing in him to play a full 60-minute match, the first time he has ever managed to done so.

While it may not be something that we think about, it can mean so much more for our athletes. Such stories are those that we treasure from taking part in a competition, and I'm deeply grateful for the organizers and my fellow coaches in recognizing the team's performance, with Team Singapore achieving the "Most Unified Men's Team" and "Coaches' Coach" Awards.

This has only motivated us to continue with our efforts to continue growing our football program, and we look forward to taking part in regional and international competitions in the coming years.

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# WOMEN'S GALLAGHER COACHES' COACH AWARD 

Head Coach of Special Olympics Guatemala, Maria Rossell Saravia awarded the 2022 Gallagher Coaches' Coach Award, for her excellent coaching skills.

Voted by her peers, Saravia was unanimously voted for this prestigious award presented by Gallagher
"I have been involved in sports my whole life. I started playing basketball at a very young age and later moved into football. I played for the football National team and also the futsal National team which allowed me to participate in several international tournaments.

My coaching education began in 2013 and I decided to specialize in Futsal. I have been a coach of the Futsal Women's National team and a subcoach for the Futsal -Men's National team here in Guatemala. I have played a part in 3 Women's Futsal World Cups.

2017 marked the start of my Club Tellioz coaching career where I was in charge of both the male and female teams. We managed to win 1 title in the female branch and 2 titles in the male branch of the Futsal Mayor League.

My call to the Special Olympics was very exciting and somewhat unexpected. I started working with them in January 2022 with the women's 7 -a-side soccer team and it really changed my life. The way I coach and how I relate to the players changed. It has been a valuable learning experience for my professional career but above all it has been a stage of huge amounts of personal growth.

With the Special Olympic team we trained for 6 months before the Unified Cup in Detroit and the players showed an incredible evolution, demonstrating it throughout the whole tournament. I feel very happy and very grateful for having received the 'best coach of the Unified Cup' award. I would like to thank the Special Olympics forgiving me the opportunity to be a part of this organization and above all for recognizing our efforts.

The Special Olympics is a program that changes lives. Mine was truly transformed as I found the true meaning behind what I had been doing for a long time. We have a new challenge to overcome with the Futsal team coming up, and that is the World Games in Berlin. I hope that through our journey we continue to change and improve lives."

## THE GOLDEN BOOT AWARD

The Golden Boot award is presented to the player scoring the most goals during the tournament.


## Adriana Ramírez Monzónd SO GUATEMALA

The Women's winner of the Golden Boot was awarded to Special Olympics Guatemala's Adriana Ramírez Monzónd with 13 goals.

Monzónd scored 9 goals during the Group Stage, 3 goals during the Semi-Finals, and 1 goal during the Women's Division 1 Final
Match against Special Olympics USA.
Monzónd had an average of 2.6 goals per match.


## Dillion Richards SO JAMAICA

The Men's winner of the Golden Boot was awarded to Special Olympics Jamaica Unified Partner Dillion Richards with 7 goals.

Richards scored all 7 goals during the Group Stage of the tournament. Giving him an average of 1.16 goals per match.

## THE GOLDEN GLOVE AWARD

The Golden Glove Award is given to the best goalkeeper of the Unified Cup.
The Women's Golden Glove award was awarded to Special Olympics USA's Radoslava Papadopoulous, with 22 saves and only 4 goals conceded. The Men's Golden Glove award went to Special Olympics Jamaica's Omarion Brown, with 24 saves and zero goals scored against him.


## Radoslava "Radi" Papadopoulos SO USA

Papadopoulos was born in Bulgaria before being adopted at age 12 and moving to Utah. The 17-year old first started playing football with her friends in Bulgaria and joined Special Olympics while attending West Lake High School in Salt Lake.

Papadopoulos had 14 saves during the Group Stage, 3 saves during the Semi-Finals, and 5 saves during the Women's Division 1 Final against Special Olympics Guatemala.


## Omarion Brown SO JAMAICA

Brown is a seventeen year old athlete and has competed with Special Olympics Jamaica for several years. During the Unified Cup, Brown had 15 saves during the Group Stage, 3 saves during the SemiFinals, and 6 during the Men's Division 1 Final against Special Olympics Paraguay.

Brown had an average of 4 saves per match.

Papadopoulos had an average of 5.5 saves per match.

## THE MOST UNIFIED TEAM AWARD

The Most Unified Team Award is given to the team that best exemplifies the Principles of Meaningful Involvement and Inclusion. The Most Unified Team award was given to Special Olympics Singapore and Special Olympics Costa Rica.

# UNIFIED CO-CAPTAINS 



The 2022 Unified Cup introduced a new element of leadership opportunities for the competing players. Unified Co-Captains were selected by each team. Co-Captains are 1 Athlete and 1 Unified Partner who share the role as captain for the team. Co-Captains had a number of duties in their role:-

1. Attend the coin-toss and contribute to decisions on whether to take kick-off or direction team will attack.
2. Interact with the match officials on behalf of their team -including, but not limited to, relaying messages from the referees and assistants to their teammates.
3. Work collaboratively with the other cocaptain to ensure a fluid and consistent message is being spread amongst the team.
4. Lead the team out before the game.

Each team was given the freedom to determine their own way of selecting their co-captains.

Some put it to a vote from the team members, while some were selected by the coaching staff.

Each team presented unique ways of embracing the Co-Captain element of the Unified Cup. This leadership opportunity presented Athletes with opportunities to support their Unified Partners in this role, and vice versa.

The role of a Co-Captain is not restricted to on-field responsibilities, they are also expected to represent themselves as leaders off the field. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Encouraging teammates through positive messages
- Encouraging healthy habits - recovery, preparation, hydration, nutrition
- Bringing the group together in positive and challenging times
- Facilitate communication between coaches and players

## 2022 OFFICIALS

As part of the Sport Impact Standards, it is highly emphasized that the standard of the technical officials and their officiating abilities provide an accurate, consistent and high-quality level of competition.

By promoting the spirit of fair play, integrity and sportsmanship throughout the entire competition, thirty-four selected technical officials assisted the Unified Cup Technical Committee in advancing the goals and ideals of the Special Olympics movement. Thirty-four officials were selected from the United States, South America and the United Kingdom.

Each official that was selected is a certified referee licensed by the United States Soccer Federation with the exception of an official with the Scottish National Federation and another with the Paraguayan Regional Federation.

These officials all possessed a comprehensive knowledge of the sport of football, rules, procedures and mechanics - thereby demonstrating and exemplifying the high standard of officiating. Cal Lovering, the Officials Technical Advisor for the Unified Cup Technical Committee said about his experience working with the officials, "Nationally and Internationally there is a core group of 20+ officials that I can call upon for any Special Olympics and know they will support. They always go above and beyond what is asked, from paying to get to an event to filling in as a volunteer setting up chairs. They are a large part of what makes Special Olympics the best soccer matches I do all year."

## 2022 OFFICIALS

The Officials listed below represent three separate countries with a variety of Grassroot, Regional, National and International federation experience. Their location codes are listed after their surname.

Each official was licensed by the United States Soccer Federation with the exception of officials with the Scottish National Federation and the Paraguayan Regional Federation*.

49\% of officials were recruited from outside the surrounding Michigan area.


Special Olympics is committed to enhancing its sports work and showcasing our athletes' person best every day. During the 2022 Detroit Unified Cup, Special Olympics tracked live athlete and competition statistics. This data was not only shared with competing delegations, but was also shared live on the official Unified Cup application and website.

Throughout the Cup athletes, coaches, families, friends and spectators could see how many shots, saves, corner kicks, penalty kicks, time played, and yellow/red cards were made for each team and athlete. Collecting and actively sharing this type of data and information was a first for the Special Olympics movement.

Providing athlete statistics to the media, coaches and families was no easy feat and something Special Olympics has been striving to do as an organization for many years. While Special Olympics already shares athlete centered content with media that generates significant coverage with partners-sport specific and data driven details of the story are usually not included.

The purpose of this Technical Report is to shift the focus not only on the experience of the athletes and their teams competing at the Unified Cup, but to highlight their accomplishments and achievements that are reinforced by the data driven insights that were collected and analyzed.

During the Unified Cup, staff and volunteers implemented an online statistical tracking application that collected competition data by match number, delegation and athlete.

This application was piloted during the 2022 Berlin National Games in June and was altered to track football specific data for the Unified Cup. Dozens of volunteers from the surrounding Detroit area participated in a training prior to competition to ensure the data collection process was accurate when working and communicating with officials. Volunteers not only collected sport specific data like shots, saves, playing time and corner kicks,

Volunteers not only collected sport specific data like shots, saves, playing time, and corner kicks, but also evaluated competing Delegation's 'Meaningful Involvement'. As part of the philosophy of Special Olympics Unified Sports, meaningful involvement is an effort to optimize participation by all team members (athletes and partners) based on the principle that every player should contribute to the success of the team. Based on a set of criteria, volunteers objectively evaluated this principle to ensure that all teammates were actively contributing to the success of the team. By collecting this information, stakeholders were able to actively see the dynamic and competitive relationship between athletes and unified partners.

The next section of this technical report showcases the data that was collected during the Cup by tournament, delegation and athlete.
