

Census Definitions and Guidance 2016

Introduction:

General Instructions:

1. The information submitted in each category should cover the calendar year, **1 January – 31 December 2016**.
2. The **Individual Total row** (second to last, in bold) includes the total number of **individual** athletes / coaches. Individuals who participate in multiple sports should only be counted once in the **Individual Total row**.
3. The Total Participation row (bottom row) is an **automatic sum** across all sports and includes athletes / coaches that participate in multiple sports, therefore individuals are double-counted in the Total Participation row.
4. The **Individual Total row** cannot be greater than Total Participation row and **must equal to** or **be larger than** the highest athlete / coach count by sport.
5. If the **Individual Total row** number is equal to the number in the Total Participation row, the system will flag an error (▲). The error occurs because it is unlikely that every athlete participates in only one sport.
 - a. Note: in a small Program this may occur, but is unlikely in a larger Special Olympics Program. If you receive an error message please review the numbers you reported in the **Individual Total row** to ensure they are correct.

M01	Number of Athletes who Trained AND Competed	<p>An athlete who trained and competed is a person with an intellectual disability aged 8 years and older who trained in a sport AND competed at least once in that sport at a Special Olympics Games or competition at any level (local, state, national, regional, or world) during the calendar year.</p>	<p>Report the number of athletes who trained and competed broken down by relevant age (8-15, 16-21 or 22+ years old) and gender (male, female) in all applicable sport categories. If the same individual participates in multiple sports, report him / her in every applicable sport category.</p> <p>In the Individual Total row report only the total number of individual athletes in the Program.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Include athletes who train and compete in Unified Sports. 2. Do not count Unified Sports partners.
		<p>"Additional" Sports are locally popular sports (Netball, Triathlon or Flag Football) that Program trains and / or offers competition in. M02	Number of Athletes who Trained but did NOT Compete	<p>An athlete who trained but did not compete is a person with an intellectual disability who trained in a Special Olympics sport, but did NOT compete in a Special Olympics Games or competition at any level (local, state, national, regional, or world) during the calendar year.</p>	<p>Report the number of athletes who trained but did not compete by relevant age (6-7, 8-15, 16-21 or 22+ years old) and gender (male, female) in all applicable sport categories. If the same individual participates in multiple sports, report him / her in every applicable sport category.</p> <p>In the Individual Total row report the total number of individual athletes in the Program.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Include athletes who train in Unified Sports. 2. Do not count Unified Sports partners. 3. Report any athletes 6-7 years old that start training in a particular sport and do not participate in the Young Athletes program
		<p>Young Athletes are athletes aged 2-7 who participate in a structured sports skills development program that is operated in a school, community or home, using Special Olympics Young Athletes materials.</p>	<p>Report the number of children participating in Young Athletes in the 2-7 age column under the Young Athletes row (listed as the last sport category).</p> <p>The Individual Total row number should be equal to the Young Athletes row number.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A Young Athlete should only be counted once per year, regardless of how many times that person participates. 2. If an athlete age 6-7 is transitioning from Young Athletes to training in a sport and continuous to participate in both, report that athlete only once in either category, preferably in “Trained but did not Compete” 6-7 years old.

M03	Total Number of Coaches	A coach is a person who provides Special Olympics athletes with comprehensive sports training and preparation for competitions within a calendar year.	<p>Report the total number of certified and uncertified coaches by sport category. If the same individual coaches in multiple sports, report him / her in every applicable sport category.</p> <p>In the Individual Total row report the total number of individual coaches in the Program.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Include coaches that coach Traditional and / or Unified Sports even if they only coach Unified 2. Include Young Athletes coaches in the total individual coach count in the Individual Total row; 3. Young Athletes coaches should include anyone referred to as a Young Athletes coach, teacher, trainer, assistant, or instructor.
MO3A	Number of Certified Coaches	A certified coach is a coach who achieved Coach Education Certification, awarded by a Special Olympics Program, National Governing Body of Sport, International Federation, Educational Institution or other Special Olympics Program/Region approved certification body.	<p>Report the total number of certified coaches by sport category. If the same individual coaches in multiple sports, report him / her in every applicable sport category.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. "Certified Coaches" is a subset of the "Total Number of Coaches" (M03). The number of Certified Coaches cannot exceed the total number of coaches (M03) 2. Report the number of athletes in all applicable sport categories across 3 Unified Sports models (see below). If the same individual participates in multiple sports and across different models report him / her in every applicable sport category and model.
	Unified Partners	A Special Olympics Unified Sports® Partner is a person without an intellectual disability aged 8 years and older who trains in a Special Olympics “Unified” sport and who competes at least once in that sport at a Special Olympics Games or competition at any level (local, state, national, regional, or world) during the calendar year.	Report the number of Unified partners in all applicable sport categories across 3 Unified Sports models (see below). If the same individual participates in multiple sports and across different models report him / her in every applicable sport category and model.

M04	Unified Sports Recreation Model	<p>Unified Sports Recreation is an inclusive recreation sports event, training program, or competition for Special Olympics athletes and Unified partners. Unified Sports Recreation activities are not required to meet the minimum training, competition and team composition requirements of Unified Sports Player Development and Unified Sports Competitive models but they must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - be operated exclusively by SO Program, or - implemented in direct partnership with SO Program <p>A Unified Sports Recreation event should involve a minimum of 25% of individuals with an intellectual disability and a minimum of 25% of individuals without an intellectual disability.</p>	<p>Report the number of athletes / Unified partners aged 8 years and older who participated in Unified Sports Recreation activities in all applicable sport categories. If the same individual participates in multiple sports report him / her in every applicable sport category and model.</p> <p>In the Individual Total row report the total number of individual athletes and Unified partners participating in Unified Sports Recreational Model.</p>
M05	Unified Player Development Model	<p>In Unified Sports Player Development, teammates are not required to be of similar abilities but age matching should be targeted. Players of higher ability should assist teammates of lower ability in developing sport-specific skills and tactics and in successfully participating in a team environment. This model should combine approximately equal numbers of Special Olympics athletes and partners as teammates on sport teams for training and competition.</p>	<p>Report the number of athletes / Unified partners aged 8 years and older who participated in Unified Player Development model in all applicable sport categories. M06	Unified Competitive Model	<p>Unified Sports Competitive Model combines approximately equal numbers of athletes and partners of similar age and ability, as teammates for training and competition. All athletes and partners competing in Unified Sports must have the necessary sport-specific skills and tactics to compete without modification of the current Special Olympics Official Sports Rules.</p>	<p>Report the number of athletes / Unified Sports partners aged 8 years and older who participated in Unified Sports Recreation activities in all applicable sport categories. M09	Total Unified Coaches	A Coach is a person who provides Special Olympics Unified athletes and partners (Teammates) with comprehensive sports training and preparation for competitions in a calendar year.	<p>Report the total number of Unified coaches by sport category. If the same individual coaches in multiple sports, report him / her in every applicable sport category.</p> <p>In the Individual Total row report the total number of individual coaches in the Program.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Include all forms of Unified Competitions conducted within the Unified Sports Competitive and Player Development models only.

<p>Total Number of Youth Volunteers</p>	<p>A Youth Volunteer is a person 12-25 years old, with or without an intellectual disability, who volunteered his/her time to support Special Olympics Program in any capacity at least once during the calendar year. Number of Athlete Leaders	<p>An Athlete Leader is a Special Olympics Athlete who is actively involved in a leadership role during the calendar year. Examples of athlete leadership roles include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Volunteer leaders at competitions, games, events or sports clinics ▪ Coaches, assistant Coaches, Sport Officials ▪ Public Speakers (Global Messengers) ▪ Representatives on Boards, Sports and Non-Sports Committees or Input Councils ▪ Volunteers in the Program office ▪ Involved in Fundraising ▪ Health or fitness leaders 	<p>Report the total number of Athlete Leaders who performed any or a combination of the outlined leadership roles.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Number of Athlete Leaders in Volunteer Staff roles at National/State level	<p>An Athlete Leader Volunteer Staff refers to an athlete who works in a skilled leadership role, year round at a National/State level, for example manages an important function in the office or manages a programmatic area such as Young Athletes, a Healthy Athletes discipline, Athlete Leadership or a sport.</p>	<p>Report the total number of Athlete Volunteer Staff Leaders working in a skilled role, year round at the Special Olympics National/State level.</p>
Number of Youth Leaders	<p>A Youth Leader is an individual with or without an intellectual disability age 12-25 who is actively involved in a leadership role during the calendar year. Examples of youth leadership roles include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Representatives of youth advisory councils and committees ▪ Board members 	<p>Report the total number of leaders in the 12-25 age category.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Athlete leaders should be included in this metric

Number of Family Leaders	A Family Leader is a parent, grandparent, sibling, guardian, custodian or caregiver who is actively involved in a Program leadership role during the calendar year. Examples of family leadership roles include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Coaches ▪ Standing Committee members ▪ Board Members ▪ Young Athletes assistants 	Report the total number of family members actively involved in a leadership role. Each family member should be counted individually.
Total Number of Registered Family Members	A Registered Family member is a parent, grandparent, sibling, guardian, custodian or caregiver registered with a Program during the calendar year whose contact information is shared with the Program.	Report the total number of family members who Program has a way to directly communicate with.

Program has a Paid Full-Time Program Director	A paid Program Director, National Director or CEO is a Special Olympics employee who receives an annual documented salary from the Special Olympics Program	Answer 1 for Yes, and 0 for No
Number of Paid Staff	A paid staff refers to paid staff employed in a skilled role by a Special Olympics Program office on a full-time or part-time basis and regularly works the agreed upon number of hours per week.	Report the total number of paid staff employed by the Special Olympics Program
Number of Paid Staff with Intellectual Disabilities	A paid staff with intellectual disability refers to paid staff employed in a skilled role by a Special Olympics Program office on a full-time or part-time basis and regularly works the agreed upon number of hours per week. Examples of skilled work include: office administration, leading a function of a Program, clerical work.	Report the total number of paid full-time or part-time staff with intellectual disabilities employed by the Special Olympics Program. Important instructions: 1. This metric is a subset of the “Number of Paid Staff” and cannot exceed it

Number of Schools Engaged in Special Olympics	<p>A School Engaged in Special Olympics is a pre-school, primary school, secondary school, college or University that offers its students the opportunity to engage in any type of Special Olympics programing. Examples include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Traditional Sports ▪ Unified Sports ▪ R-Word Campaign ▪ Research ▪ Fundraising 	<p>Report the total number of schools engaging in one or multiple Special Olympics opportunities.</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Schools engaged in multiple Special Olympics opportunities should be counted once.
Number of Unified Schools	<p>A School Engaged in Unified Sports is a pre-school, primary school, secondary school, college or University offering Unified Sports opportunities to its participants.</p> <p>For the United States a “Unified School” is defined as a “Unified Champion School” at the pre-school, elementary, middle or high school level or a number of University Clubs at the college and University level.</p>	<p>Report the total number of Unified Schools in the Program</p> <p>Important instructions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. If a non-inclusive school works with a special needs school to offer Unified Sports opportunities to students of both schools, count them as two separate schools. 2. Number of Champion Schools reported by the United States Programs should be consistent with the number of schools reported in the mid-term report to SONA

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS:

In addition to Census, the Program Policy and Health Survey must be completed by all Programs and follow the same submission deadline as Census.
