Due to my battle with scoliosis, my height is only 150 cm, but this has not stopped me from loving and excelling in various sports, as well as from bravely exploring different possibilities. I work as a manager at a car wash shop, where I interact with customers every day. I enjoy jobs that involve socializing with people, as it allows me to share my incredible journey with Special Olympics over the years. Telling my stories makes me feel honored and purposeful, and I hope that my story can inspire others and encourage more people to join the Special Olympics movement.

I believe I was the first student at my school to discover the competition information on the Special Olympics website, and I proactively approached my teachers to

form a team for the competition. Facing teams from different schools, I was both excited and nervous, but I encouraged my teammates to be brave, strive for victory, unleash our full potential on the field, and demonstrate our unity and determination

Special Olympics has become deeply integrated into my life. It has made my life more fulfilling and exciting. In addition to participating in local basketball and floorball competitions, I also represented Special Olympics Chinese Taipei in regional events in East Asia, where I met teams from different countries and territories. While improving my sports skills, what brings me even more joy is the opportunity to make new friends with Unified partners who share the same passion.

Even more fortunately, in 2023, I had the privilege to represent SO Chinese Taipei as a leader at the Special Olympics Global Youth Leadership Summit in Berlin, Germany. Alongside youth leaders from around the world, I participated in workshops, exchanged ideas, and launched inclusion initiatives. There, I felt deeply that I was part of the larger Special Olympics family. I also made my pledge to continue promoting Special Olympics to raise awareness among those who were unaware of its significance, helping people understand that individuals with intellectual disabilities could contribute as much as anyone else.

MESSAGE FROM LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends.

On behalf of Special Olympics East Asia (SOEA) I am pleased to share with you our efforts and achievements for the past year. In 2023, we saw determination and diligence in returning our Movement back to normalcy after the long pandemic. We were able to slowly return our events back to off-line activities while continuing to utilize virtual engagements where appropriate. Our mission to engage people with and without intellectual disabilities (ID) into our Movement to promote inclusion and equality remains our unwavering focus.

Our largest event for the year was the Special Olympics World Summer Games in Berlin, Germany in June. About 6000 athletes and Unified Partners representing 178 delegations participated and competed in 25 different sports categories. Over 420 athletes and Unified partners represented our 6 SOEA programs and showed their best showmanship at the Berlin Games, receiving over 400 medals in total. Most importantly, our delegations enjoyed the joy of sports and

the honor of participating in this largest showcase sports competition in the world for people with ID.

During the World Summer Games in Berlin, a very high-level and important SOI initiative was launched, which is the Global Leadership Coalition for Inclusion. This Coalition will strengthen education and social welfare systems, as well as improve best practices amongst countries that are deepening their commitment to social inclusion. From the SOEA Region, we are grateful to the governments of China and Mongolia, for being two of the first countries to commit to building more inclusivity in their respective countries.

Regional Sports activities also slowly returned to on-ground format and our first-ever all-female football league was held to promote female team sports, a mandate from SOI. Coach training sessions were held both virtually and in-person to encourage and train up more coaches, which is the primary way for us to recruit more athletes. After the pandemic, our most important task is to bring back our athlete and participant count to at least where we were before the pandemic. Unified sports, Motor Activity Training Program (MATP) and a variety of regional and local competition training and games were all organized and held by our Sports team to benefit our athletes and their Unified partners.

Whenever we can, we always incorporate youth and athlete leadership activities into our events, especially during our World Games. More than 100 Youth leaders, with and without ID, congregated at the 2023 Special Olympics Global Youth Leadership Summit in Berlin to learn, lead and lift each other to drive more inclusive behaviors and practices. Leadership and capacity building for our athlete and youth leaders through training and summits, encouraging our youth to various creative ways including applying

for Innovation Grants, telling our athlete stories as well as training and encouraging Unified School leadership to share their experiences with each other through our Leadership Forums, are all important achievements by our SOEA Organizational Development Team.

Maximizing awareness and building brand presence is core to the efforts orchestrated by our Marketing, Communications and Development team to promote Special Olympics in and beyond our Region. We cultivate relationships with a wide variety of partners, ambassadors, donors and supporters while promoting our brand via social media, both domestically and internationally.

Our Healthy Athletes screenings have returned to being held off-line and more clinical directors and volunteers have been trained up in 2023 to provide pro-bono medical service to ensure our athletes receive opportunities to understand and maintain their physical and mental health better. Many local-funded screening events have been successfully organized and executed by our Health team.

In addition, many strides have been achieved in our partnership with United Nations and its agencies in the Region as well as across Asia. A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between SOEA and UNICEF China to signify a mutual commitment to disability inclusion and the rights of all children and youth. This partnership was immediately operationalized through UNICEF China's support for the SOEA Youth Innovation Project and the release of animated videos to raise awareness about the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD). We look forward to more closer collaboration in the future.

All in all, we've had a busy year and we are most grateful for the generous support that you, our supporters, donors and partners, have given to us. We would not be able to achieve our goals and targets for our Movement in our Region without your contributions. On behalf of our SOEA team, our athletes and families, we would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you for your great support to us throughout the year.

Thank you and we are looking forward to an even more exciting 2024 and working with you to continue making this world one of more acceptance and inclusion.



2023 Special Olympics East Aisa Unified Schools Football League

April 2023



The Special Olympics 2023 East Asia Unified Schools Football League was held in Fengxian District, Shanghai from April 17 to 21, 2023 and attracted 8 domestic teams with 88 participants. It was the first time that SOEA held a Unified female football competition to encourage more female athletes to join team sports. During the competition, the LOC also prepared cultural experiences featuring Chinese

Jiangnan rural characteristics for the athletes, including intangible cultural heritage handmade tie-dye, Zhelin rolling lamp, and Jiangnan sculling boats. These arrangements aimed to provide more opportunities for communication and create a harmonious coexistence environment for Special Olympics athletes and Unified Partners, fostering meaningful connections and helped Special Olympics athletes better integrate into life.





2023 Special Olympics Chengdu 3v3 Basketball Competition



2023 Special Olympics Chengdu 3v3 Basketball Competition was held in Qingyang District, Chengdu from May 10 to 11, 2023, with a total of 12 teams and 94 participants. The competition divided the 12 teams into 3 groups based on the results of the divisioning. The participating teams included both from Unified Schools, and from the communities, which increased the diversity of the competition. This event not only provided a stage for Special Olympics athletes to show their talent in basketball, but also encouraged more new Special Olympics families to actively participate in sports.



2023 Shanghai Badminton Competition

September 2023

2023 Shanghai Special Olympics Badminton Competition was successfully held at the Jing'an V Jump Badminton Hall on September 24 and 25. Hosted by Special Olympics, the badminton competition was supported by Pudong Enpai Public Welfare Foundation's "Qingya Sports Rehabilitation" Special Fund and co-organized by Shanghai Lucky to Have You Public Service Center and Shanghai Youth Development Promotion Center. The event also received support from Walt Disney (China) Co., Ltd. as charity partner.







The badminton competition was open to city-wide athletes who received year-round Special Olympics-style sports training. Through recruitment channels such as the Enpai Qingya Sports Public Welfare Foundation, trainees, parents' organizations, and special education schools, a total of 160 athletes attended. The competition was divided into four sessions, with 40 athletes participating in each session. The aim was to ensure fairness and justice in the competition and to explore the athletes' individual potential.

COACH WORKSHOP & TRAINING

2023 Special Olympics China MATP Coach Workshop

May 2023



2023 Special Olympics China MATP Coach Workshop was held in Chengdu from May 8-11, 2023, co-organized by Fujian Normal University and Chengdu Qingyang District Special Education School. The participants included the local MATP coach team from Qingyang District Special Education School and more than 30 special education teachers from across China. The purpose of this

workshop was to raise the awareness of Special Olympics, promote MATP


development, and enhance the professional knowledge of Special Olympics coaches. The workshop was delivered by experienced lecturers from MATP technical advisory group of Fujian Normal University.



2023 Special Olympics East Aisa Virtual Cheer Coach Workshop

November 2023

The Special Olympics East Asia Virtual Cheer Coach Workshop was successfully held on November 14-15, 2023. The two-day course attracted nearly 120 cheerleading coaches from various Programs in Special Olympics East Asia. The workshop featured professional lecturers, including Darian Packard, the Global Advisor for Cheer and Co-Chair of the Cheer of SO Resources Team, and Lee Trudell, an expert from the International Cheer Union (ICU). Over two days of virtual training with ICU, the coaches gained extensive cheerleading expertise and learned how to teach Special Olympics Cheer athletes. The virtual workshop also included a presentation by a coach from



Chinese Taipei, the principal of Miaoli Special School, who shared their experiences at ICU's World Cheerleading Championships.

Unified Schools Football Training Program-Guangzhou

Year round

With the great support of City Football Group, Guangzhou Unified Schools had conducted an all-year-round football training program, including coach education, routine players training, and group training. A Unified football festival was scheduled for the end of the year. Through this project, the young leader team from Guangzhou Sport University visited the Unified schools 36 times, conducted 6 online training sessions, and guided 2 offline football exchange games, benefiting more than 2,000 Special Olympics athletes and Unified partners.



2023 Unified Schools

Year round



Thirteen Unified Schools events were successfully held with the guidance of 2 technical teams. The Unified Schools programming was designed to facilitate Special Olympics Unified Sports, provided classroom and community experiences that reduced bullying and exclusion, promoted healthy activities, combat stereotypes and negative attitudes, eliminate hurtful language in schools, and engage young people in activities that lead to improved behavior and a better school climate.

In 2023, the Unified Schools events were mainly held in Shanxi Province, featuring football, basketball, track and field, fun games, etc. The activities benefited approximately 2,500 Special Olympic athletes, Unified Partners, parents and volunteers.

YOUTH LEADERSHIP

Regional Youth Leadership Summit

September 2023

The "Moving Together" Virtual Youth Leadership Summit, a collaborative initiative between Special Olympics East Asia and UNDP Asia-Pacific, served as a dynamic platform for over 200 youth leaders with and without intellectual disabilities, to foster change in line with the UN SDGs and the CRPD.

The Summit featured engaging sessions, including "Intro to the SDGs", "Innovative Mindsets", "Inclusive Youth Leadership", "Unified Leadership", and "Youth Strategies and Declarations for an Inclusive Future", facilitated by guest speakers from Special Olympics, UNDP Asia-Pacific, and the UN Youth Office, alongside young leaders with ID who have benefited from SOEA's and UNDP AP's youth programs. The collaborative event underscored the critical values of inclusion, understanding, and acceptance, drawing participants from a wide geographical scope to engage deeply with the principles of global sustainability and rights for individuals with disabilities. At the same time, it strengthened the network of changemakers and equipped them with the knowledge and skills to drive initiatives in their communities, demonstrating the impactful collaboration between Special Olympics East Asia and UNDP Asia-Pacific in nurturing a generation committed to building a more inclusive world.



Innovation Grants and Regional Youth Engagement Committee

Year round

In 2023, twelve Youth Innovation Grants were awarded to Youth Leaders, with and without intellectual disabilities, from Special Olympics East Asia Programs. Half of these projects were inspired by the Berlin Special Olympics Global Youth Leadership Summit held in June. Over the course of nine months, youths are leading these projects, focusing on creating inclusive campuses, communities, and networks. Their goal is to engage more children, adolescents, and youth in the Special Olympics community, enhancing the movement's visibility and growth among these groups.





The SOEA Regional Youth Engagement Committee (YEC) members from the 2020–2023 and 2024–2026 classes have contributed to this project as well. In 2023, the YEC initiated three activations: Capture the Moments, Share Your Summer Life, and Footprints for Inclusion, furthering their mission of promoting inclusion as young leaders.

Out of these awardees, six Unified projects were identified and launched in mainland China through the collaboration and selection process of Special Olympics East Asia and UNICEF China. These projects, which address inclusivity in various fields such as education, employment, sports, health, environment, and advocacy, showcase the efforts that young people have dedicated to social change.




ATHLETE LEADERSHIP

Regional Athlete Leadership Training and Regional Athlete Leadership Council

August 2023





With the support of organizations such as UNICEF China, Inclusion Factory, and WEable, the training placed a strong emphasis on actionable skill-building to achieve community impact by cultivating a leadership network centered on the theme of "Team Up Lead Up".

The training also provided a crucial opportunity for 2021–2023 and 2024–2026 Regional Athlete Leadership Council members to meet, ensuring a smooth transition and preparing the new class for their roles. This approach underlines the commitment to sustainable leadership development and the advancement of inclusion.

Our Time to Shine

Year round

In 2023, Special Olympics East Asia featured eight stories authored by athletes on Weibo and WeChat, a column dedicated to their personal narratives inaugurated at the beginning of the pandemic back in 2020. This column has motivated athletes to share tales about their lives and the people around them, highlighting their journeys toward inclusion and demonstrating their abilities and perspectives to a broader audience. The stories emphasize how providing equitable support, opportunities, and platforms can help fulfill the potential of people with ID.

Moving forward, SOEA is committed to continuing its collaboration with professional facilitators and visual trainers to discover new ways in crafting content that empowers more athletes to share their stories with a wider audience.

Regional Leadership Council

September 2023

After a three-year pause due to the pandemic, the Special Olympics East Asia Regional Leadership Council Meeting resumed in person and was successfully held in Hong Kong from September 5 to 6. Leaders from all six SOEA Programs, regional offices, and the SOI headquarters gathered for in-depth discussions on approaches and tactics to promote local programming, the Healthy Athletes program, and Marketing and Development. The main objective was to promote the effective implementation of the Special Olympics strategic plan within the region.





During the meeting, remarkable milestones and progress from the past year were revisited, fostering a spirit of learning and inspiration among the Programs. Additionally, a consensus was reached that the position of Council Chairperson would rotate every two years among the Programs, enabling each Program to contribute to the Council.

The meeting coincided with the regional bocce competition, where all RLC representatives attended to cheer for athletes and Unified partners. By joining the event, everyone experienced the joy of Unified Sports.



SOEA Program Governance Training

May 2023

The Virtual SOEA Board Governance Training was held on May 9 and 16 in response to the imperative for Special Olympics to navigate the increasingly challenging changes at all levels. This training convened board members, executive leaders, and staff from all six SOEA Programs, covering topics aimed at achieving exceptional governance within our organization. The knowledge and skills provided during the training were designed to help



build a high-performing Board and to clarify the respective range of responsibilities necessary for effectively governing a non-profit board. Gaining new and enhanced insights about governance models, frameworks, systems, and tools enables our board members, as well as the board to work more effectively, sustainably, and with a greater sense of accomplishment.



UNIFIED SCHOOLS

SNF Play Unified Learn Unified Project

Year round

In 2023, we continued our partnership in phase II of the SNF Play Unified: Learn Unified project with Special Olympics China, Special Olympics Chinese Taipei, and Special Olympics Mongolia. This initiative has enabled the Programs to lead the way in fostering the movement for inclusion by expanding Unified Schools across their territories. By the end of the year, the project had extended its impact to 468 schools.





Co-hosted by Special Olympics Shaanxi, the virtual and in-person Unified Schools trainings were held in mainland China to enhance the capacities of coaches, teachers, youth with and without ID, as well as volunteers. This, in turn, strengthened the quality of Unified Schools programming locally.

Special Olympics Chinese Taipei and Mongolia continued to leverage large-scale events in schools and communities to engage people of all

abilities in experiencing the joy of sports. This approach effectively garnered the attention and support of local government ministries, other non-profit organizations, communities, and media outlets, opening up more pathways for athletes to become better integrated into society.



Unified Schools Leadership Forum



After three years of stagnation due to the pandemic, the Special Olympics East Asia Unified Schools Leadership Forum returned to being held in person in Xi'an, mainland China. Representatives from over 100 Unified Schools and staffs from all six East Asia Programs attended the forum.

In addition to the conventional practical sharing and Unified Sports experience sessions, the forum covered various new topics, including the Easy-to-read Simplified Chinese Guide, Accessibility and Reasonable Accommodation, Comprehensive Sexuality Education for children and youth with disabilities, and research findings on inclusive education. These new developments, ideas, and concepts undoubtedly inspired and enlightened both



new and existing Unified Schools, further acknowledging the transformative significance of Unified Schools and the driving force they provide for everyone.

Advanced Family Leadership Training Resource

As a continuation of the efforts from the previous year, SOEA developed four new modules for an advanced Family Leadership training resource in 2024 and kicked off the testing phase. The modules in the advanced course focus on different areas but all aim to enhance the competencies of Family Leaders. This process enables the internalization of the principles outlined in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, assisting families in conveying the inclusive concepts of Special Olympics to a wider audience in the community using appropriate skills and methods.

A total of 60 Family Leaders, deliberately selected from the outstanding learners of Special Olympics China, Special Olympics Macau, and Special Olympics Chinese Taipei, participated in the training and actively engaged in the co-creation process of the new modules. As part of the practical exercise in the courses, the trained family leaders have also conducted outreach and training sessions for families and community members at the local level.



SO Educational Visual Resource

Mav—December 2023

Establishing a correct understanding of Special Olympics at the grassroots level is closely correlated with the development of local programming. Family members serve as one of the most important mediums for publicity, making it crucial to deliver an accurate message about the Special Olympics. In response to this need, SOEA has launched a series of educational videos that address misconceptions about Special Olympics. These videos are narrated by six Special Olympics athlete leaders to clarify the true nature of Special Olympics as a global movement.

Additionally, real-life cases and stories provide significant emotional resonance and guidance for families. Videos featuring practical case studies, which represent challenges and the corresponding measures taken for Family Engagement programming at different stages of development, are presented by four family leaders from the East Asia region. These educational videos are designed to be easily understood and utilized, applicable not only in family community settings, but also in various promotional occasions and initiatives.



Young Athletes Community Outreach and Localization

Year round



Building on the accumulation of the past five years, Special Olympics East Asia has successfully incubated local SO Program at the grassroots level through the Young Athletes Program. To evaluate past successes and lessons learned, and to create a more diverse network and collaborative partnership model in communities, schools, and families, the first SO Community Development Forum was hosted by Rongzhi, a local organization specializing in conducting Special Olympics activities, in Chengdu from March 30 to 31, with the support of SO East Asia. The forum, which focused

on Young Athletes and Health Program, brought together over 90 participants from special schools, universities, institutions, family organizations, and foundations to discuss the needs and opportunities for developing Special Olympics programming. One of the follow-up outcomes was the launch of a Young Athletes curriculum optimization project in August, aimed at providing more context-based guidance for implementing Young Athletes in mainland China.





Regional Young Athletes Coach Training


May 2023

In alignment with the global strategic focus and to facilitate the growth of Young Athletes across the region, the Virtual Young Athletes Coaches Workshop was held from May 17 to 19. Over 210 participants from all six Programs of Special Olympics East Asia enrolled in the training. The workshop covered curriculum guidance resources for supporting the development of Young Athletes, from building basic skills to



transitioning to sports, as well as case studies of implementing Young Athletes in various settings.

It not only helps everyone gain a more comprehensive understanding of Young Athletes, but also prompts each coach and teacher to re-examine the purpose and goals of teaching children with ID. Additionally, it maintains the motivation for teachers to create inclusive and empowering environments for special children through sports, leading them toward countless possibilities for success.



GLOBAL DEVELOPMENT AND GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

Engagement of China and Mongolia Governments in Special Olympics' Global Leadership Coalition for Inclusion

Year round

In June 2023, during the Berlin Special Olympics World Summer Games, China and Mongolia stood out as two of the first countries to pledge their commitment to the Global Leadership Coalition for Inclusion. This collective action underscores a shared dedication to enhancing the lives of individuals with ID through concerted efforts in education, sports, and community engagement.





China's commitment to the Global Leadership Coalition for Inclusion is evidenced by its ambitious targets for 2024 - 2026. The nation plans to establish 2,000 new Unified Schools, create 2,000 inclusive community centers, and engage 500,000 participants. This commitment was highlighted during the visit of Dr. Timothy Shriver, Chairman of Special Olympics International to China, where he met with Deputy Foreign Minister Ma Zhaoxu and the China Disabled Persons' Federation underscored China's resolve to advance the Special Olympics vision.

Mongolia's commitment mirrors this dedication to inclusion, aiming to establish 90 Unified Schools, involve about 2,700 youths in inclusive programs, and set up 30 Unified Sports clubs. This pledge was reinforced through productive meetings between Special Olympics Headquarters, the East Asia Regional Office, Special Olympics Mongolia, and Mongolian government officials, including the Prime Minister and other ministers, highlighting Mongolia's strong support for the Coalition's ambitions.




The proactive steps taken by China and Mongolia not only exemplify leadership in building inclusive societies for individuals with ID, but also serve as a beacon for other countries within and outside the Special Olympics East Asia region to join this transformative commitment

Rehabilitation International Outstanding **Achievement Award**

May 2023

On May 24, Dr. Timothy Shriver, Chairman of Special Olympics International, was present with the China Disabled Persons' Federation, Special Olympics East Asia, Special Olympics China, and other partners in Beijing to receive the Rehabilitation International Centennial Outstanding Achievement Award. This award recognized Special Olympics' work promoting inclusion for people with ID around the world. Only two organizations in the world received this honor in 2023, which included a \$200,000 grant to support efforts to enable people with disabilities to lead fulfilling and productive life.



During the visit, Dr. Shriver met with China's Deputy Foreign Minister, Ma Zhaoxu, who represented the Chinese government's commitment to expanding Unified Sports and education programs, as well as engaging young people through enhanced partnerships with Special Olympics. This commitment marked a significant step forward in the global movement to advance inclusion and the rights of individuals with ID.





Partnerships and Engagements with Regional and International Organizations UN Partnerships

Year Round

In 2023, SOEA significantly enhanced its collaborations with the United Nations, culminating in more formal and enriched partnerships. Through joint efforts and mutual participation in events, SOEA and the UN have ensured reciprocal contributions and benefits, solidifying a partnership aimed at promoting inclusion and realizing the rights of individuals with disabilities.



UNICEF



In September 2023, SOEA and UNICEF China marked a significant advancement in their collaboration by launching a partnership at the UNICEF China office. The signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on September 11 signifying a mutual commitment to disability inclusion and the rights of all children and youth. This partnership was immediately operationalized through UNICEF China's support for the SOEA Youth Innovation Project and the release of animated

videos to raise awareness about the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD). The collaboration was further celebrated during the World Children's Day event in Beijing, which brought together a diverse group of children, including those with ID. This ongoing partnership exemplifies a deepening commitment to children's and disability rights, with both organizations continuously engaging to develop future initiatives aimed at fostering a more inclusive society.

UNDP



SOEA maintains a strong relationship with UNDP, coordinating its representation at the Berlin Special Olympics World Summer Games. This included delivering the Disability Inclusion Strategy and conducting a workshop to gather athlete input for the Special Olympics International Board of Directors. The "Moving Together" 2023 SOEA Virtual Youth Leadership Summit, co-hosted with UNDP Asia Pacific, aimed to empower youth leaders with and without ID to become community change agents, which is well-aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Goals and the CRPD.

Other UN Engagement

SOEA sustains its interactions with other UN entities, including the UN Youth Office, UNFPA, UNESCO, and UNRCO in China - through meetings, social media engagements, and information exchanges - underscoring a commitment to broadening its impact and advocating for a disability-inclusive society. Special Olympics' publication of a brief titled "Expanding Inclusion Through Purpose-Driven Partnership" shares the best practices and insights gained from these experiences.



Resource Development

SDGs Education and Resources

Leveraging the valuable insights and successes from 2021 and 2022, SOEA has continued its collaborative efforts with UNDP China to enhance the Movers educational modules, making them more accessible and relevant to individuals with disabilities. This ongoing partnership has resulted in the development of two new modules focused on Gender Equality and Wellness, specifically tailored to be disability-friendly and relatable.





Animated CRPD Videos

This animated short series, created by the Special Olympics East Asia and the YouRen Foundation, explores the daily lives and challenges faced by people with disabilities. It provides clear and engaging information suitable for individuals with ID as well as people of all ages and abilities. The series aims to deepen the public understanding of the disability community and the Convention, highlighting that the Convention is relevant not only to those with disabilities but also serves as a public education resource on disability.



Easy-read Simplified Chinese Guide

Collaborating with the Shenzhen Information Accessibility Research Association, the "Chinese Simplified Easy-to-Read Version Reference Guide" was launched to establish a unified standard in the Chinese context. This guide simplifies language use by presenting shorter sentences and clearer visuals for easier comprehension. It is applicable in the medical, legal, and financial fields, helping to prevent misunderstandings, reduce the risk of errors, and ensure that important information is more accessible to everyone. Recognized for its impactful contribution at the 2023 Information Accessibility Outstanding Case Selection, this guide lays the foundation for widespread practice and promotion, aiming to enhance the accessibility of information through technology and assist various organizations in providing more understandable content.

30 Special Olympics athletes, including 5 athletes who would compete at the Special Olympics World Summer Games Berlin 2023, were invited to

join the run. Ms. Freda Fung, SOEA Regional President, spoke at the opening ceremony and introduced the athletes and Ms. Yang Yang, our Special Olympics Global Ambassador, to the audience. Ms. Gong Jinjie, Chinese Olympics Female Cyclist Gold Medalist, also attended and was deeply impressed by the Special Olympics' spirit she observed from our athletes. Their presence was a great encouragement to everyone at the event. Everyone had a great time, and the event received a wide media coverage.



Love Football and Treasure Water in Shanghai

April 2023

The WaterMark project, initiated by City Football Group's global charity foundation program, Citizens Giving, and the leading global water technology company Xylem, celebrated a football festival to kick off the second year of the project, "Love Football and Treasure Water", in Shanghai. Up to 150 people participated in the event, including 20 staff members from CFG China and 15 volunteers from Xylem's local company. Participants played alongside 50 SO athletes and Unified partners from Shanghai Pudong Special School and its Unified Partner



School, Foreign Service School. As part of the Champion Trophy Tour in China, Manchester City brought the trophies they won in the last Premier League and their legendary football player Paul Dickov, who was popular among the participants. The athletes also created artworks featuring themes of football and water to express their passion for sports and their commitment to environment protection.

The project aims to use football to provide vital water education to 5,000 young people in five cities around the world, including Shanghai, Mumbai, Sao Paulo, New York and Cape Town. It will provide essential education on water, sanitation, and hygiene through specially adapted football games.

Berlin 2023 World Games

June 2023



Athletes from all around world came together to proudly represent their countries and jurisdictions on the global stage, inspiring a worldwide audience with their courage, perseverance, and the spirit of the Special Olympics. More than 7,000 Special Olympics athletes from approximately 190 Programs competed in 26 sport disciplines.

At the opening ceremony, Dr. Timothy Shriver, Chairman of Special Olympics International, delivered an inspirational speech, highlighting the Game's great potential to

change the world. Chinese tennis star Li Na raised the flag of the World Games to bring it to a climax, conveying the unity and strength of the athletes. Well-known TV host and social entrepreneur Yang Lan also attended to offer encouragement and blessings to the athletes.

New Global Ambassador joined the Movement—Zhou Guanyu July 2023

F1 racing driver Zhou Guanyu has pledged his support for creating more sporting opportunities for the people with ID by becoming a Global Ambassador for Special Olympics. Born in Shanghai, China, 24-year-old Zhou is the first driver from China to race in a Grand Prix, having made his debut for Alfa Romeo in 2022 after previously racing in F4, F3, and F2.

Special Olympics International CEO, Mary Davis, along with Freda Fung, Regional President of SOEA, visited Special Olympics Chinese Taipei on December 1 to attend the 2023 Special Olympics Unified Schools Leadership Forum at Chiayi Minzu Primary School. There, they observed the progress of Unified Sports and Schools Programs in Chiayi City. Mary also delivered inspiring words of encouragement to the school principals and teachers, emphasizing the positive impact of Unified Sports on their students.

Prior to this, they enjoyed watching athletes and partners learning to play Unified bocce at Chiayi Minsheng Secondary School. The athletes had a great time experiencing Unified Bocce alongside their guests.
