I work to teach children tolerance, I own my own home, I speak 4 languages, I hold two honorary doctorates and I still stay in shape Mrs. Obama, by playing sports all year round! I know the world can change.

In grade school my teacher said I was too dumb to understand I just graduated from the College of St. Benedict with a double major in Peace Studies and Theology. I recently won the Peace First Prize, a two-year fellowship to create peaceful and supportive schools and communities. I am creating the theology of the unified generation.
